While my husband and I were visiting his family a few weeks ago, we had the privilege of co-preaching at his home church in College Station, Texas. The theme of the service was "Gathered and Sent" and we preached about why the Church is gathered into local churches, and how and what the Church is sent forth into the world to do. As the summer season unfolds, each of us will be sent forth from this gathered community of faith to places old and new. I, along with a group from King's Chapel and First Church, Boston, will be sent forth to Kolozsvar for the first half of July. In late August, I will be sent forth to the Unitarian Universalist Leadership Training Institute, where I will serve as a presenter. ✦ MASON FERNALD'S MAJESTIC GIFT CLOSES ANNUAL APPEAL

*\$50,000 Contribution Lifts Total to Reach Interim
Goal for 2011*

A Majority of Members and Friends Contributed

This year's Appeal was notable for the percentage of us who participated – a healthy and encouraging trend. And more and more of us are contributing beyond token amounts, understanding that only we ourselves are available to pay for the programs and services we expect and to which we feel entitled.

Final Weeks Saw Completion of Pledges

Pledges account for substantially more than half of what the Appeal receives. This year our completion rate was very high. While the campaign is formally over, we will not close our books for a few more days, to accommodate the mere handful of pledges that have yet to be fulfilled.

Year-end Contributors

The group of "year-enders" were again generous this May and June, accounting for a surge of stewardship which propelled the Appeal forward in our closing weeks.

Matching Funds Program

The program had its intended effect, with a goodly number of folks increasing their stewardship beyond that of the previous year to take advantage of the match. Also notable were early 2011 contributors, who came back to add to what they had already given, once the program was put in place.

Video of 325th Morning Prayer

Responding to the suggestion of a major donor who cannot get to services, we recorded the June 12, 325th Year Pentecost celebration which included Harvey Cox's sermon, the full choir plus brass, and the welcoming of new members. General availability will be worked out in the fall.

Annual Appeal Plan for this Summer

Our church has acquired new software to improve how your Annual Appeal performs its duties of solicitation, record-keeping, pledge recording and acknowledgement with tax notices in a more consistent manner than in the recent past. This summer we will work with our new Church Administrator to upload verifiable data and implement the system.

VESTRY VIEWS

At the Vestry meeting in May we welcomed three new members: Pat Bass, Anne Sexton and Ty Muscat. We have ten Vestry members this year, but next year this will be reduced to nine in accordance with the recently passed bylaws. At that time, four members will be leaving, to be replaced by three new members.

Richard Weeks has been keeping the Vestry informed of the Society's finances, which have been aided by recent gifts to the Annual Appeal. At this point, we are cautiously optimistic that we will be finishing the year with a favorable result with respect to the budget. We continue to watch our expenses closely as we prepare for the next budget, which will be presented to the Society in October. One bright spot has been the Visitor's program, which has been running ahead of plan all year. Revenue from this program may exceed \$100K this year.

In April, we completed the carpeting project in the main chapel, for a total expense of \$12,711. This was largely offset by the \$8,213 that we raised from our very successful auction. There are a number of small items in the Chapel that need to be addressed—we will be working on these in the near future.

The Rev. Dianne Arakawa made a suggestion that we consider changing our lectionary to the Revised Common Lectionary and create a Liturgy team. At present, we are using the Common Lectionary from 1986, and therefore our readings are not the same as most other churches that use the common lectionary. One of the reasons for this was the timing of the last revision, which occurred after we published our prayerbook. The Vestry was favorably inclined toward this proposal, and agreed to consider it after we have had a chance to compile a comparison between the two lectionaries.

We have had two requests for filming at King's Chapel – one from a student, and another from the television program "Ghost Hunters." The Vestry has been discussing terms under which we would allow these efforts to take place.

The Vestry also took up the old issue of the deterioration of the west garden wall at the Parish House. This has become a safety issue, so the Vestry has voted to spend up to \$24,000 to repair the wall. The funds will be taken from a reserve fund that is dedicated for that purpose.

✦ **325TH ANNIVERSARY REFLECTION**

On Sunday, May 8th, the Reverend Carl Scovel delivered a sermon for the 325th anniversary year of King’s Chapel. In his inimitable style and not expectedly, Carl preached about the church in the context of its venerable history from 1686 until now. But, it was clear from the beginning that he had a special message for the parishioners of 2011: do not despair that your numbers are small (Judges 7:1-7).

Inspired by this message of hope and reassurance, parishioners gathered spontaneously at the Parish House one week later to talk it over. They were present for many reasons, no doubt, but mostly to express their responses individually to the sermon and, as became evident, to strengthen their collective faith in a bright future. One by one, people spoke of their convictions. They spoke of the ways King’s Chapel has drawn and held them. They spoke of the church’s strengths and their growing aspirations for a vibrant congregation of the future in worship, fellowship, and service. They spoke of the enduring spirit of loving and caring. The words were convincing and the affirmations real.

Of special significance was Jesus’ parable of the mustard seed, only two verses long but now infused with new meaning. “The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches” (Matthew 13:31-32).

✦ **MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE**

Early in June, the position of Senior Minister at King’s Chapel was officially posted with the UUA, the UCC, and the UUCF, and also at Harvard Divinity, Episcopal Divinity, Andover-Newton, and Yale Divinity as well as at other schools and seminaries beyond New England. As of the deadline for the summer Newsletter, the Committee had received some interesting inquiries.

The June Newsletter mentioned the Committee’s mock interview with an already settled UCC minister. We held that “interview” in late May, and it was extremely helpful. The “candidate” asked us some challenging questions including how does King’s Chapel know that it’s ready to search for a settled minister, and he gave us feedback on the process, such as how our pace affected him. In addition, he was a wise and delightful person. The Committee will continue its work during the summer.

Tory Stories runs on the half-hour from 10:30am-3:30pm.
