**The seasons seem to be changing in fits and starts** this year. I write in the middle of a warm day with monsoon-like winds, but just a few days ago ice formed in the Lagoon in the Public Garden, and transformed the reeds along the side of the Charles into dramatic thick ice sculptures. Boston's move from autumn to winter has been advancing slowly, but erratically: two steps forward, and one backward.

Changes anywhere often come in fits and starts, even in our lives. How marvelous if there were one clear trajectory for us humans, moving smoothly from infancy through childhood, growing in wisdom and stature. How helpful if each time we suffered a defeat as a teenager, we learned the lesson and matured, gliding on to the next stage of needed insight and clarity. The journey would continue seamlessly through adulthood, until we were perfected and complete as we aged, like cheese or wine. We'd be imbued with wisdom, never backsliding.

I remember daydreaming as a teenager (and maybe even after that) how wonderful it would in the weeks ahead, because I'd be more patient with myself and all others. I was resolved. I had a plan. I'd implement it. The new, kinder Joy was about to emerge! And then my darn humanity would surface, and I'd be less than I had hoped and dreamed. Has that ever happened to you?

No seasons of life ever move seamlessly from one stage to another – neither global weather patterns nor human development. Not even the life of a church community. For this reason, the church year gives us a full month of Advent to move towards Christmas, and later six weeks of Lent to prepare for Easter. For these big days of celebration – Christmas and Easter -- we humans need time to get ready, the two steps forward and one back of life.

I don't just mean that we need a sufficient number of days to prepare for Christmas by sending out the holiday cards, decorating the church with greens, or wrapping the presents. We need time to wrap our minds around the astounding good news we'll proclaim on Christmas Day: that through a child named Jesus, God lived within a human, right here on earth. Not within the fine trappings of an expected King, powerful and mighty, but born homeless in someone's borrowed garage.

Maybe especially for those of us who've heard this story for decades, it's hard to listen again deeply, with astonishment and wonder: What does this story mean for me today? God within a baby, God within a child, God within an adult, God within me? Do I then see myself differently? Or the beloved in my care; or the crabby cashier; or the person from another land? What do we make of all those shabby shepherds and odd Kings who kept showing up unexpectedly at the stable?

December likely won't be completely smooth for any of us. But at King's Chapel, we can join together on the journey through the month. There are lots of opportunities – explore them! It could make all the difference in your life. It's good to be journeying with you all, in our life together in this church and in Boston. I am grateful.

### ❖ **Holiday Bake Sale for Massachusetts Coalition for the Homeless**

Again this holiday season the Community Action Committee is assisting the MA Coalition for the Homeless by selling delicious Dancing Deer baked goods to benefit the Coalition's "A Bed for Every Child" project. This project raised over \$25,000 last year, and this year the Coalition hopes to provide at least a thousand more beds and bedding for children who right now must sleep on the floor or share a bed with a family member.

He and other CAC members will also be available to take orders in the vestibule after church on November 24, and December 1 and 8. ### ❖ **Our Newest Community Partner: The New England Center for Homeless Veterans (NECHV)**

CAC has recently begun a partnership with one of our closest neighbors, the N.E. Center for Homeless Veterans, or "Court Street," as it is known locally. The Center provides temporary shelter, transitional housing, career assistance, and other services to those who have served in the U.S. military. One of our own KC members, Grady Jones, is a former client of the Center who now works there as a manager.

On November 7, King's Chapel joined corporate, foundation and individual sponsors, with our own table at the NE Center's annual benefit gala. We were inspired, and hope you will be too.

### ❖ **PLEDGING TO RESPOND TO THE NARRATIVE BUDGET: How Do We Want to Grow and Thrive?**

The 2013 First Narrative Budget was presented for review and discussion to our congregation at large on Sunday, November 17. The Budget presented a graphic, visual representation of our current programs and their related expenses. It also offered a range of options for us to consider for ways to grow our church in our own lives and within our community.

For starters, our minister, in her "Widening the Welcome" summation in The Budget, discussed some of the most often named initiatives brought forward during the investigation that preceded drafting the Narrative Budget. Cited for more emphasis were:

- Adult Education, including more small groups, a variety of retreats, and interfaith conversations;
- Church School, re-invigoration with new trained staff, new teen programs, nursery school, children participating in morning prayer, and more congregational care;
- Audio, increased capacity for recording, assisted listening, and broadcast for sermons and music, so both can be heard more than once, and in remote locations;
- Pastoral Care, reaching out to everyone, whether ill or well, plus fun events to help us continue growing the Beloved Community;
- a possible New Worship Service, to be developed over the summer and fall, building on our traditions but offering alternatives to our 11 AM Morning Prayer;
- Our Work in the City – increased support and funding for our Community Action Committee to develop additional initiatives, perhaps with a focus on homelessness.

It is clear that for us achieve "Widening the Welcome" not only for ourselves, but also to the larger community, will require increasing our annual operating budget. Being as creative as we can be with our finances, the fundamental calculus still leads us back to increasing our own stewardship by increasing our membership, increasing our per capita gifts, and relating contribution to membership.

The 2013 First Narrative Budget also shows us that there are striking disparities among the sources of our own income and congregational norms of our local peer churches, as well as how we generally think we support our church. For example :

- our Visitors Program generates slightly more income (19%) as our own Appeal giving (18%);
- although our average donation has almost doubled since 1998 (from \$631 to \$1,166), it is still comparable to the very lowest per giver of neighboring churches;
- we have only one-third of the givers as we did then (from 278 to 90);
- and we rely more than twice as much on our endowment (the Trusts) for operating income as our peer churches do (54% compared to 24% and 22%, the two closest to us).

We have put off our 2014 pledge drive until just after the first of the year, recognizing that it will be more meaningful if related to ideas for our going forward. Indeed, our church's response in pledging will be our first of vote of confidence in our own ability to respond to the Narrative Budget working together over the year to craft the vigorous, committed and passionate church to which we aspire. Your Appeal Committee chairs are certain that our habitual end-of-year givers will help us complete a successful 2013 Appeal without very much more encouragement. The 2014 Annual Appeal will focus us again on widespread and committed pledging as a core value of membership. We look forward to your enthusiastic support.

## FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR

### Concert: Goldberg Variations on December 1

Our next Sunday concert takes place on December 1 at 5 PM when Heinrich will take on Bach's Goldberg Variations. He has been working on this project since the spring and spent part of his summer sabbatical holed up in various churches around the globe chipping away at learning all 30 variations. The famous Canadian pianist Glenn Gould made his name playing these variations on piano, but of course they were originally written for harpsichord. The arrangement for organ you will hear at this performance was written by German composer and organist Wilhelm Middelschulte (1863-1943), a well-known Bach interpreter and first rate contrapuntist in his own right. Middelschulte took full advantage of the additional "dimensions" of the organ, transferring parts from the left hand to the pedal and allowing for multiple manuals to clarify counterpoint texture that is not so easy to hear on the piano or harpsichord. So even if you are intimately familiar with the Variations, you are sure to experience a slew of new things in this performance.

We will have hot cider and treats in the vestibule following the performance, so bring a friend and wrap up your Thanksgiving weekend/start your Advent season right!

### First Night

As many of you know, the non-profit organization that ran First Night for all these years folded earlier in 2013. The city of Boston has taken over operations, and since this is the first time the event is put on under this aegis, at press time it is a little difficult to get a handle on the exact scope of things. But the plan is to have our traditional organ recital at 9 PM; this year Heinrich will play a "Goldberg Variations redux", i.e. about half the variations, so you can end December just the way you began it. We will have special tickets available for parishioners and their friends, so please make sure to contact the Parish House with your ticket request if you would like to - or buy a First Night button (rumored to be available at CVS this year, but again, check the web and local media as the event approaches for up to date information).

## ADVENT LESSONS

Advent is the four week period leading up to Christmas, a time to prepare for the new birth, within each of us, of "Emmanuel," which means "God with us."

For the four Sundays of Advent, in my sermons I'll be exploring the birth narratives told by Luke and Matthew. Why do the Three Kings appear only in Matthew and the shepherds only in Luke? Why does Matthew focus on Joseph, but Luke makes Mary central? Do the differences between Matthew and Luke render both suspect, or can we understand deep truths even from myths and parables? I'll draw on [The First Christmas: What the Gospels Really Teach About Jesus's Birth](#), written by Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan. If there is interest in January, there will be a follow up book group and discussion.

We have just completed a Lectionary year based on Luke, and are about to begin a year of Matthew, so comparing these two different Gospels is a good way to begin the new Christian year, this Advent. Come worship weekly to learn more, or read the sermons on the church website, [www.kings-chapel.org](http://www.kings-chapel.org).
