Walk the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma and visit the Morris Brown Chapel and the By the River Center for Humanity

Pilgrimage Leaders

The Pilgrimage will be led by June R. Cooper, who is the Theologican in the City at Old South Church in Boston and Marrey Embers who is an organizational development consultant and diversity equity and inclusion trainer. Together they have designed and led virtual and in-person civil rights pilgrimages since 2014. They will lead three (3) pre-pilgrimage training events, facilitate the pilgrimage, and conduct one post Pilgrimage debriefing session.

Preparation for the Pilgrimage

We expect this trip to be rich with emotions, history, good food, music, and conversations. Therefore, to maximize this learning experience preparation for the Pilgrimage includes 3 (2 hour) Study Sessions that will be scheduled 6 weeks prior to our departure date. One (2 hour) post-Pilgrimage debriefing session will be scheduled within 2 weeks of our return.

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
